



Hughlene Bostian Frank Visiting Writers Series

Anne Waldman is a poet, performer, professor, and cultural activist. She is the author of more than 40 collections of poetry and poetics and an active member of the Outrider experimental poetry movement, creating new hybrid forms for the long poem, as with Marriage: A Sentence, Structure of the World Compared to a Bubble, Manatee/Humanity, and Gossamurmur, all published by Penguin Poets. Her publications include Marriage: A Sentence (2000), the magnum opus The lovis Trilogy: Colors in the Mechanism of Concealment (2011), and Voice's Daughter of a Heart Yet to Be Born (Coffee House Press, 2016). She is a Distinguished Professor of Poetics at Naropa University, in Boulder, Colorado, and artistic director of its Summer Writing Program. She received the American Book Award from the Before Columbus Foundation for lifetime achievement in 2015.

Calvin Baker is the author of the critically acclaimed novels Naming the New World, Once Two Heroes, Grace, and Dominion, which was a finalist for the Hurston-Wright Award, a New York magazine Critics' Pick, and a New York Newsday Best Book of the Year. Early in his career, Baker worked as a journalist at the New Orleans Times-Picayune, Time Inc., and The Village Voice. More recently, his nonfiction has appeared in Harper's Magazine and The New York Times Magazine. Baker was born in Chicago, attended the University of Chicago Lab Schools, and graduated from Amherst College, where he received his degree in English with highest honors in the major. He lives in Brooklyn, New York.

Dennis Covington is an American writer whose work includes two novels and four nonfiction books. His subject matter includes spirituality, the environment, and the South. Covington's book *Salvation on Sand Mountain* was a 1995 National Book Award finalist, and his articles have been published in *The New York Times*, *Vogue*, and *Redbook*. His most recent book, *Revelation: A Search for Faith in a Violent Religious World*, chronicles his travels in Syria during the ongoing civil war.

Born in 1948 in Birmingham, Alabama, Covington studied fiction writing and earned a BA degree from the University of Virginia, then served in the U.S. Army. He earned an MFA in the early 1970s from the Iowa Writers' Workshop, studying under Raymond Carver. He taught English at the College of Wooster. He married his second wife, writer Vicki Covington, in 1977. The couple returned to Birmingham the following year, and he began teaching at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. They have two daughters and three grandchildren.

Linda Hogan is a former faculty member at the Indian Arts Institute, Writer in Residence for the Chickasaw Nation, and Professor Emerita at the University of Colorado. Recent volumes include *DARK. SWEET. New and Selected Poems* (Coffee House Press, 2014); *Indios; Rounding the Human Corners*; and *People of the Whale*. She is also the author of *Mean Spirit*, a winner of the Oklahoma Book Award, the Mountains and Plains Book Award, and a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize; and *Solar Storms*, a finalist for the International Impact Award and a *New York Times* Notable Book of the Year. Her most recent awards include the 2016 Thoreau Prize from PEN and the Native Arts and Culture Award.
